JOSEF has a 12 Member Board of Trustees headed by Prof. Matthew A. Izibili. The Project Team consisting of 19 persons (4 Staff and 18 Volunteers) is headed by Comrade Jude Obasanmi, Ph.D. JOSEF is dedicated to care, development and upholding/defending issues affecting humanity and the environment. Using the symbiotic umbrella approach, we strive to cover both the interest of the able and challenged, as well as young and old individuals.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The year being reported was a very challenging for the Foundation. This was mostly attributed to the unexpected cost of things in the country. The Foundation was however, able to implement over 60% of the approved work plan. The following were part of the activities carried out:

The 7th Board of Trustees (BOT) meeting was hosted by the Foundation March, 22nd 2023. The meeting approved the work plan, reviewed the external auditors report and commended the good reports from the External Auditors and prayed for more collaboration and support. The high point of the meeting was the pledge of two hundred thousand naira by Bishop Mon Igbinosa to support the office rent.

Part of the health intervention in the year being reported was the TB intervention Like other years, the Foundation offered psychosocial support to patients, monitored drug adherence, conducted Advocacy, Community and Social Mobilization (ACSM), identified and referred fresh cases for screening and also linking patients to care. We commemorated the 2023 World TB Day, had market campaigns highlighting the causes and possible remedies. About 2,700 persons were reached. Next was the World Immunisation Day where we had online campaigns through flyers and street campaigns. Also, the World Malaria Day was marked on the 25th of April. The Foundation in collaboration with the Medical Students Association AAU Ekpoma Chapter and Indomitable Youths Organisation marked the 2023 WMD. There were online campaigns through flyers and street campaigns and free testing and administration of malaria drugs.

In partnership with the Ministry of Health Edo State and World Health Organisation, the Foundation commemorated the 2023 World Menstral Day at Ujoelen Secondary School, Ekpoma. A team from the Ministry of Health and WHO had an interactive session with over 70 girls in the school. They were educated on how to have and sustain good personal hygiene particularly during their cycles. Thereafter, sanitary pads where shared to all the students and they were told how to effectively use and dispose them.

Project team members and volunteers took part in a Round Table dialogue organised by the Civil Society for HIVAIDS in Nigeria with other partners (Ministry of Health, EDOSACA, Planned Parenthood Federation of Nigeria, Heartland Alliance Foundation) in Benin City to mark the 2023 World AIDS Day (WAD) which is a global movement celebrated annually every December 1st to unite people in the fight against HIV and AIDS.

The Foundation had online campaigns in all her social media platforms with messages centered on the causes of HIV infections, how to avoid infection, symptoms, amongst others, WAD rally that took place in Benin City, free HCT. HIV Counselling, Screening and testing.

The Foundation continued to implement the Global Fund Harmonized C19RM/RSSH grant in Esan West LGA under the supervision of ACOMIN. The Foundation attended all the Monthly Coordination Meeting and trainings organised by NACA-ACOMIN, Had advocacies, identifying success stories and working in communities to get results. Some of the success stories were the renovation of the Ukhun PHC, attracted a resident nurse to the PHC. At Ujoelen PHC, the Foundation facilitated the donation of eight (8) complete sets of beddings to Ujoelen PHC and also provided 4 Office tables of different sizes to the PHC. Finally, with technical and material inputs from The Challenge Initiative (TCI) and the Ministry of Health Edo State, we continued with the Adolescent and Youths Reproductive Sexuality Health (AYRSH) intervention in three LGAs: Igueben, Esan West and Etsako West. About 13,400 young persons were reached with Life Planning for Adolescents and Youths (LPAY) messages and services.

3 LGAs hosted our sensitization and outreaches on ills of irregular migration and trafficking in person. The Foundation was able to integrate issues of migration into the CAFES Module for secondary schools, completed registration with the Network Against Trafficking, Abuse and Labour (NACTAL) and got a donation of Books and two external harddrives from IOM and Edo State Taskforce on Human Trafficking (ETATH). About 1800 persons were reached wiyh different messages on irregular migration.

Our educational advantaged continued with the CAFES Project in Schools. There were Five sessions of the expanded project on Addressing the Girl Child Dropout Syndrome in Schools (AGCIDS) / Children Against Forced Engineering Studies (CAFES) Project. The project seeks to address for instance the rise in school

dropout amongst young persons in the senatorial district, low self-esteem, poor parenting and counseling on career path, lost socio-cultural values and increase in drug and substance addiction amongst young persons, leading to sexual immorality and poor reproductive health consciousness, ills of irregular migration and so on. The Foundation reached over 500 students.

The 5th Annual Lecture to mark the Feast Day of St. Josémaria Escriva took place at Esan West Council Secretariat, Ekpoma. The lecture titled, 'Migration and Good Governance: The Quest for an Enduring Solution', was delivered by Very Rev. Fr. Dr. Joseph Okojie, Director of Liturgy/Pastoral Affairs, Seminary of All Saints, Uhiele, Ekpoma. This is also part of our efforts to impact on the community and also create awareness about the Foundation's activities. Participants were drawn from the academia, policy makers, religious and traditional rulers, students, security agencies, etc.

72 Teachers in public primary schools in Esan Central Local government area took part in the Teachers Skills Enhanced Project (TSEP) aimed at enhancing the teaching skills in schools. The project involved training 60 Teachers and 11 Learning and Development Officers (LDOs) in Esan Central and Esan West LGAs to have enhanced self-esteem, stress management, time management, effective lessons delivery, class room management and ICT skills by 2027. The Project was funded by TY Danjuma Foundation.

JOSEF was actively involved in the activities of the Edo State Management and Technical Teams on Sexual and Gender Based Violence. The Foundation did community sensitization, and case identification. The Foundation handled seven cases of SGBV in Edo Central LGA. Some were cleared while one is in court. To mark the 2023, 16 days of activism, the foundation partnered with the ministry of health to have series of activities in the Senatorial district. Also, the petition served on the Edo state government on Sky burial Rites going on in some parts of Edo State got the attention of the state government. This saw the government partnering with the Foundation to hold stakeholders meetings. for a and street rallies in the affected communities in Akoko Edo LGA.

The annual Widows and vulnerable support programme of the Foundation still took place. With the kind and supportive disposition of some individuals we were able to facilitate the support of 20 Widows. The Management of Chosen Hotels supported 120 widows and vulnerable and also gave out cash of N200,000 each to two widows and a promise to support a Virtually impaired Law graduate to go to the Law School.

On the Foundation's 200" x 200" project site along Ukhun Road, by the AAU Staff Quarters, Esan West LGA, we are yet to do a building plan and get it registered due to funds.

In 2023, a total of Eight Million, Seven Hundred and Seventy Eight thousand, Seventy One Naira, Twenty Kobo only (N8,778,071.20) was realized as Project Funds and from other activities while the sum of Seven Million, Seven Hundred and forty Three thousand, Four Hundred and Eighty-Seven Naira, Thirty Kobo only (N7,743,487.30) was expended on various projects and interventions. Balance carried forward is One Million, Thirty-Four Thousand, Five hundred and Eighty Three Naira, Ninety Kobo only (N1,065,571.20).

The Foundation's accounts for the year 2023 was audited by a firm of Chartered Accountants and certified that the books of accounts were kept in line with best accounting practice.


WORLD AIDS DAY (WAD): DECEMBER 1, 2023

Global Fund harmonized C19RM/NACA/RSSH Project

Introduction

The Foundation continued to implement the Global Fund Harmonized C19RM/RSSH grant in Esan West LGA under the supervision of ACOMIN. The project was planned to end in June 2024 but what later extended to 2025. The RSSH component of the grant contributes to making foundational changes by strengthening the health systems in local communities in Nigeria through targeted interventions that support the federal government health reforms to drive sustainable improvements to reduce the impact on AIDS, Tuberculosis, Malaria and COVID-19.

Activities conducted so far.

- 1. Attended all the Monthly Coordination Meeting in Benin City
- 2. Attended trainings organised by NACA-ACOMIN on advocacies, identifying success stories and working in communities to get results.
- 3. Advocacy visits to the PHC Coordinator, Esan West LGA Dr. Aimua Ehijele, Mr. Sam Ogbemudia, Head Establishment, Mrs. M. Ordia Ukhun PHC Matron, Mrs.T. Uwaifoh Ujoelen PHC Matron, and other relevant stakeholders from the host community. They offered useful support and corporation and promised to sustain the project in the community
- 4. Conducted 3 Entry and Exit Focus Group Discussions in the community
- 5. Conducted 3 Key Informants Interview with the PHC Coordinator and the matrons at the PHC to further establish areas of concerns and improvements.

Success stories

- A. <u>Ukhun Community</u>, Esan West LGA.
- 1. Renovated the health centre at Ukhun
- 2. Facilitated the increase in demand for services at the PHCs through advocacies and campaigns. This saw an increase of over 40 percent as at August 2023 when compared with the figures of around the same time last year (2022).
- 3. Attracted a resident nurse to the community. This has helped to sustain patronage of the facility. the facility should be made to run for 24 hours
- 4. The Community Youths started to maintain the surroundings of the PHC. An effort which they have pledged to sustain.

ADOLESCENTS YOUTHS SEXUALITY AND REPRODUCTIVE HEALTH (AYSRH).

JOSEF ANNUAL LECTURE SERIES

Introduction

The 5th Edition of Josémaria Escriva Foundation (JOSEF) Annual Lecture to commemorate the Feast Day of Saint Josémaria Escriva was held on Thursday, June 29, 2023, at Ekpoma. The lecture was aimed at increasing the body of knowledge, productivity, service delivery, quality and impact of the Foundation in the society. The lecture also served as an avenue to reflect on the various activities of the Foundation. The theme of the 5th Annual Lecture was 'Migration and Good Governance: The Quest for an enduring solution' was delivered by Very Rev. Fr Dr. Joseph Okojie of the Seminary of All Saints, Uhiele, Edo State.

Four members of the Board of Trustees were present physically: The Chairman of the Board, Prof. Matthew A. Izibili, Prof. Mrs. Elizabeth Ifidon, Mrs. Ruthmary Obasanmi and Comr. Obasanmi Jude PhD. Prof. Don Enobakhare and Bishop (Dr) Mon Igbinisa joined online. The occasion was chaired by Hon. Engr. Emmanuel Ibhadode. Some of the guests present were representatives of Head of Local Government Administration, Esan West LGA, Mr Chris Ize-Iyamu, Hon Joe Ibhamawu, Member, Representing Esan West Constituency in the Edo State House of Assembly represented by Hon. Irene H.A, Members from the Academia, Mr Lucky Isibor representing NUJ, Civil Defense Corps, Edo State Traffic Management Agency, JDPCI Uromi, Community leaders, Opinion Leaders, Local Government Education Authority Secretaries from Esan West and Esan Central LGA, youths, students (secondary and tertiary), TYDF, Development Partners and CSOs. About One hundred (100) persons were present at the event.

The programme had drama presentation entitled "Irregular Jakpa no dey pay" done by Volunteers of JOSEF. The lecture, with the theme, 'Migration and Good Governance: The Quest for an Enduring Solution', was delivered by Very Rev. Fr. Dr. Joseph Okojie, Director of Liturgy/Pastoral Affairs, Seminary of All Saints, Uhiele, Ekpoma. The Guest lecturer identified various types of migration, causes of migration (push and pull factors), the nexus between Migration and Good Governance. He concluded that good governance was the most potent weapon to overcome poverty and reduce the rate of illegal migration in Nigeria.

The Panel Discussions had Mr. Peter Aisagbonhi (Country Representative for KBA-NOTASYs of Switzerland in Nigeria) and Mrs. Eseigbe-Ehimien Tina (Nursing Officer, ISTH, Irrua). The panelist shared their experiences and at the end the session agreed that, although it was a fundamental right of people to travel but it should be done in a way that migrants will not be subjected to unhealthy experiences.

Lessons Learnt

- i. The drama presentation served as an illustration for the theme of the Lecture.
- ii. Use of Bulk SMS, phone calls and reminders helped in ensuring that people attended.
- iii. Awareness creation should be improved upon especially when a programme has to do with youth.
- iv. It is important to distribute question slips to participants during question and answer sessions.
- v. The Facebook live streaming was a plus as it gave the opportunity to other outside the venue to join.
- vi. Conscious efforts should be made to commence at the scheduled time.
- vii. Get approval from ministry of education to enable invited schools to attend.

Next steps

- i. The Foundation should start planning for her 6th Annual Lecture and 10th Anniversary. It is our hope that a compendium of the Foundation's lectures and activities will be published and launched
- ii. Identify and work with other stakeholders.
- iii. Have a round table conversation of the outcome of the event (Communique issued).

TEACHERS SKILLS ENHANCEMENT PROJECT (TSEP PROJECT)

Introduction

The TSEP Project is funded by TY Danjuma Foundation. It is a five years project aimed at enhancing the skills of teachers in some identified areas - Knowledge in subject area content and effective curriculum delivery strategies using the Teachers Tablets, building self-esteem, time and stress management, writing and communication, and class room management skills. The project is being implemented in Esan Central and Esan West LGAs. A total of 10 Learning and development Offiers and three hundresd class room teachers in Public Primary school would be trained on an annual basis of 110 LDOs and 30 teachers per LGA.

- i) 27 Monitoring Visits by the LDOs and JOSEF Team to schools.

Other results achieved from the implemented activities.

- i. There is available baseline information that would serve as reference point for knowledge gained and impact assessment.
- ii. Materials for training were validated and made available to the trainers and participants.
- iii. 60 Teachers have improved in subject area content and effective curriculum
- iv. Demystified the fears and concerns in the use of the Teachers Tablets.
- v. Teachers had improved knowledge in subject area content and effective curriculum delivery strategies using the Teachers Tablets.
- vi. Teachers were able to develop their self-esteem, acquired time and stress management; writing and communication and class room management skills.
- vii. Review meeting afforded the LDOs, JOSEF Project Team and TYDF to compare notes and proffer possible ways of meeting project objectives.
- viii. 87 Step-down Training sessions conducted by the Teachers expanding the scope to 177 additional Teachers indirectly reached.
- ix. Monitoring visits by the LDOs and JOSEF team to schools enabled team to access quality of mastery of contents taught and adherance to various strategies on how to improve on content delivery, self-esteem, time and stress management; writing and communication skills; and class room management, tips on sexual based violence, amongst others.
- x. 60 Teachers were able to share experiences and best practices, success stories and steps towards effectively making use of the Teachers Tablets,

Impact stories.

- i. Mr. Michael Okosodo said that before the start of the programme there were some critical challenges he felt could not be managed based on time allotted to lessons. With the training on Time and Stress management he was able to realise that the time he wasted on some tasks were more or else based on the stressful conditions associated with the school work and use of the TC. Now, with the training, he has started implementing some unique strategies like ensuring a "To do list" is usually generated for each day and at the close of work takes some time to evaluate his work during the day.
- ii. With the lesson on effective communication, Mrs.Gloria Ebhota said that the training on communication has helped to have a much more effective interaction with her learners. A situation where the Teachers assuming what is being said by the learners does not help in ensuring communication and making the learners to effectively express themselves,
- iii. Mrs Blessing Iyoha, Oriolade Primary School, Orialade, Esan West: The session on Pedagogy and Montesori skills has continued to expose her to modern ways of getting young learners have the desire to learn. This was coming at a time when the use of Teachers Tablet and access of learners to android

phones to so many kiddies packages has thrown a bigger challenge to the class room teacher to realise that they have to beef up their montessori skills.

Lessons learnt.

- i. Including potential beneficiaries in the course of developing the proposal helped in ensuring that they are able to on their own assess, see and appreciate the efforts currently being made by the Foundations (TYDF and JOSEF) in addressing their peculiar challenges that they felt were note solvable.
- ii. Getting the LDOs trained by the Foundation to conduct the training for the other teachers was very impactful. The LDOs were able to give real life experiences and examples based on the fact that part of the task of the LDOs is to monitor and guide the Teachers under their care.
- iii. Conducting practical sessions, having case studies on the various themes.

The 16 Days of activism for 2023 had the them, Let the Community lead. The high point of the 16 Days was a one day Consultative Meeting/Sensitization Campaign at Igarra on the Violence Against Person Prosecution Law (VAPPL) to end the practice of Sky Burial and its implications in Akoko Edo and environs. , with the Theme: Unite and Prevent The Practice of Sky Burial was the focus of the consultative meeting. In her opening remarks, the Edo State Commissioner of Social Development and Gender Issues, Hon. Mrs. Christabel Omoh Ekwu, commended Josémaria Escriva Foundation (JOSEF) for taking a bold steps on calling the Edo State government in condemning the evil practices of Sky Burial and to formulate a reforms for the eradication of this evil practices in some communities in Edo State. The highlight of the event was the review of the Edo State Violence Against Person Prosecution Law (VAPPL) by Mrs Lauretta Asaka, Esq, who represented the Attorney General and Commissioner of Justice Barr Oluwole Osazee Uzi. 
